Oyster Bay leaders - Saladino, Imbroto, Hand and LaMarca Plant 1/2 Million Clam, Oyster Seedlings into Bay

Oyster Bay Supervisor Joe Saladino was joined last week by town officials Councilmen Lou Imbroto and Thomas Hand, and Town Clerk Rich LaMarca in seeding over half a million oyster and clam seedlings into Oyster Bay harbor.

Those seedlings were planted into protected "conservation zones" of the harbor where they may not be fished or dredged, and will mature into a vast and rich "oyster bed."

The half million shellfish will purify the water, and then spawn millions of future clams and oysters into areas of the bay - expanding the oyster bed - where baymen and recreational clammers can harvest fresh shellfish for years into the future.

"Oyster Bay Harbor is one of the

proud to be doing more than ever before to improve its water quality," stated Saladino. "Programs like these help bolster the local economy while improving water quality, as just one mollusk can filter up to 50 gallons of water per day.'

"Over the past several years, we've placed millions of baby clam and oyster shells into our local waterways," added Councilman Lou Imbroto. "We are making great strides to improve water quality and bolster the shellfish population, while preserving the natural beauty of our local waterways for generations to come."

The Town has seeded millions of new clams and oysters in Shellfish Sanctuaries in the harbor over the past

multipronged effort to clean the water, and to support the oyster and clam industry in Oyster Bay Harbor and Cold Spring Harbor.

Hundreds of "Baymen" are employed full-time or part-time - fishing for oysters and clams out of Oyster Bay, Bayville and other local communities.

Violent Knife Assault at Late Night Huntington Bar

A supposedly upscale Huntington bar was the scene of a bloody knife attack on October 5th, that sent one man to the hospital and left two fugitive violent criminals on the run - and still at large.

The assault happened around 12:40AM. on October 5th at the "Tap Room" bar, located at 363 New York Avenue in Huntington.

The victim was a patron at the late-night bar and got into an argument with two other men.

According to Suffolk County Police investigators, the two men then violently attacked the victim with both perpetrators having "sharp objects" - knives most likely - and stabbed at the victim.

The victim was cut and injured, and he was taken to Huntington Hospital by ambulance.

The victim was treated at the hospital, with "non-life threatening" injuries.



MEDICARE ENROLLMENT SCAMS

The StateWide Fraud of the Month is a component of the Senior Medicare Patrol (SMP), the definitive resource for New York State's older adults and caregivers to detect, prevent, and report healthcare fraud, errors, and abuse. StateWide is New York's grantee/administrator for this Federal Program.

Maria Alvarez, Executive Director of StateWide, advises seniors to be wary of potential scams involving Medicare Enrollment Fraud, "As Older Adults look for their best health coverage options, make sure to keep an eye out for fraudsters! Open Enrollment can quickly become an "Open Season" for scammers, she explained.

Alvarez advises Seniors to watch out for these several potential Medicare Enrollment scams:

Scammers may claim to represent Medicare:

• Medicare will never call to sell a plan. If someone says they're an "official Medicare agent," hang up!

Scammers may ask for personal

· Never give Medicare numbers, Social Security numbers, bank or credit card numbers info to an unsolicited caller or visitor.

Scammers might pressure or threat-

 Scammers use fear and deadlines. Seniors will not lose benefits for refusing to enroll immediately.

They offer gifts or rewards to enroll:

• Offering gifts (over \$15) to sign up for a plan is illegal.

· Don't let free offers rush any enrollment decisions.

"If you suspect your Medicare number has been compromised or you've been enrolled in a plan without your permission, contact the New York State Senior Medicare Patrol (SMP) at 800-333-4374, or visit www.nysenior.org. We have trained counselors to help Medicare beneficiaries in the fight against fraud," Alvarez concluded.

StateWide also provides information and educational presentations, assistance regarding any Medicare questions, plan comparisons, appeals, billing issues and patients' rights to all seniors throughout New York State.

It is estimated that Medicare fraud costs taxpayers over \$60 billion dollars nationally per year. To help combat this illicit industry StateWide announced its Fraud of the Month program in 2022 to highlight these scams being perpetrated on the State's sen-

PAN PANZENBECK AND TEAM FOR GLEN COVE



Pam Panzenbeck was elected as the Mayor of Glen Cove four years ago, and is now seeking another term.

Grizopoulos is a first-time candidate, and pledges to protect Huntington against overdevelopment. He is well known as a gentleman - something we need more of in Huntington government.





David Christie enlisted in the United States Navy on June 3, 1967, completing

boot camp at Great Lakes before attending Class "A" Signalman School in Newport, Rhode Island. He was first stationed aboard the USS Bennington (CVS 20) out of Long Beach, California, serving with Ship's Company on a seven-month Vietnam cruise. He was later assigned to the USS Oriskany (CVA 34) out of Alameda, California, completing another seven-month deployment to Vietnam.

His distinguished service earned him several commendations, including the National Defense Service Medal, Vietnam Campaign Medal, Vietnam Service Medal, and the Armed Forces Expeditionary/Korea Medal. He received an Honorable Discharge on April 30, 1971.

After his honorable discharge from the U.S. Navy, he returned to Glen Cove and subsequently began working for

the U.S. Post Office. Several years later, he met his wife, Victoria, and the two of them settled in Glen Cove. Now retired, they both still live in the same house where they raised their son and daughter.

Those same values guided his 25 years of active service with the Glen Cove Volunteer Fire Department, where he is now a 50-year lifelong member. When he joined the Post Office, David became close friends with Howard Stillwagon of VFW Post 347, and together they joined the Post's softball team—eventually becoming league champions.

"David Christie represents the best of Glen Cove — courage, commitment, and service to others," said Mayor Pamela D. Panzenbeck. "We are proud to honor him this Veterans Day for his sacrifice and dedication to our nation."






