Massive Fire at Big Valley Nursery in Glen Head

A massive fire broke out last week at the Big Valley Nursery on Glen Cove Road in Glen Head, drawing a response from more than 150 firefighters.

The massive fire erupted at around 8AM, and took over two hours before it was put-out.

Firefighters from Glen Head and Glen Cove responded to the fire.

The fire started in a storage building stocked with flammable landscaping and gardening supplies, with the flames bursting through the roof and torching the adjacent buildings. The storage structure was destroyed and partially collapsed.

At one point, first responders entered the building to pull out flammable materials that were feeding the fire, according to fire officials.

Three firefighters were treated for minor injuries at the scene.

Nassau County Police said Glen Cove Road and Cedar Swamp Road shut down for about two hours before reopening that afternoon.

"We're just grateful nobody was seriously hurt," said a witness across the street. "The smoke was unbelievable."

Glen Cove Road and Cedar Swamp Road were closed for roughly two hours before reopening later in the afternoon.

No cause of the fire has yet been determined.

Syosset Parent, Student Arrested for Explosives

A 15 year old Syosset student and his father were arrested last Wednesday, April 22, 2026 for making explosives in their Syosset home.

The case came to the attention of police as they investigated the student for painting sawstikas at his school - the Syosset High School.

The arrests were made by detectives from the Nassau County Police, Second Precinct.

According to police, detectives first had conducted an extensive investigation of a "Bias Incident" that occurred at Syosset High School, on Southwoods Road.

The Bias incident was a swastika drawn in a male restroom at the school, and the police investigation determined who drew the Swastika, a 15 year old male student.

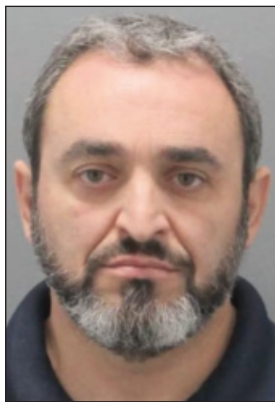
They then went to the 15 year old student's residence, where they discovered several chemicals at this location that had been combined to create explosives.

After finding the explosives, police evacuated the residence - and evacuated residents of neighboring homes.

The Nassau County Fire Marshal, Arson Bomb Squad, and the Nassau County Police Emergency Service Unit

(ESU) were all notified and responded to the scene. The Nassau County Hazardous Material (HAZMAT) Response Team also responded and carefully removed the hazardous explosives from the home.

Further police investigation discovered that the boy's father, Francisco Sanles, age 48, had on multiple occasions, paid for the purchase of the various chemicals. He was placed into custody without further incident.

The elder Sanles is charged with two (2) counts of Criminal Possession of a Weapon 1st Degree, two (2) counts of Criminal Facilitation 4th Degree, two (2) counts of Endangering the Welfare of a Child and Reckless Endangerment.

He was arraigned on Thursday, April 23, 2026 at the Nassau County District Court.

The juvenile defendant was charged with two (2) counts of Criminal Possession of a Weapon 1st Degree, Criminal Mischief 4th Degree, Aggravated Harassment 1st Degree and Making Graffiti, and will be arraigned at the Nassau County Family Court, as a juvenile offender.

Gotti Grandson Sent to Jail for COVID-Funds Fraud

Mob boss John Gotti's grandson, Carmine Gotti Agnello, an Oyster Bay businessman, was sentenced to 15 months in federal prison for defrauding a COVID-19 relief program of more than a million dollars in taxpayer funds.

The case reflects both the lingering shadow of his family name and the modern forms of financial crime which emerged during the pandemic.

Beginning in the early months of the pandemic, between April 2020 and November 2021, Agnello applied for at least three loans under the Small Business Administration's COVID-19 Economic Injury Disaster Loan program, a federal initiative created to keep small businesses afloat during the crisis.

He submitted the applications in the name of his business, Crown Auto Parts & Recycling LLC, a scrap and auto parts operation based in New York. Prosecutors later revealed that the company was no longer operating when he sought much of the relief money, undercutting his claims that the funds were needed to sustain a functioning business.

On the applications, Agnello lied about key facts, including his criminal history, in order to qualify for aid reserved for legitimate enterprises struggling with pandemic shutdowns and economic disruptions.

Through these misrepresentations, he secured about \$1.1 million intended to support payroll, rent, and other basic expenses. Instead, prosecutors said, he diverted a substantial portion - roughly \$400,000 - into a cryptocurrency venture unrelated to the stated purposes of the loans.

Federal prosecutors in the Eastern

District of New York charged Agnello with wire fraud, and in September 2024 he pleaded guilty to a single count.

At his sentencing, Agnello appeared with family members, including relatives with their own histories of federal convictions. He addressed the judge, calling his actions "wrong, selfish and criminal" and saying he felt deep guilt and shame for what he had done.

Judge Nusrat Choudhury sentenced Agnello to 15 months in prison plus restitution of over \$1.2 Million.

The sentencing followed a delay earlier in 2026, when Agnello's lawyers told the court he planned to donate a kidney to his mother, Victoria Gotti, the daughter of the late Gambino crime boss. But the kidney donation had not taken place by the time of sentencing, and the judge ultimately rejected a request for home confinement.

Agnello, who was once known as a spiky-haired reality television personality on the A&E show "Growing Up Gotti," has been ordered to surrender to begin serving his sentence on July 20th.

Blumencranz, Pironi Running for NYS Legislature

The retirement of NYS Senator Jack Martins created a cascading series of vacancies to fill in north shore legislative districts, and the Republicans have "moved-up" Assemblyman Jake Blumencranz (R-Brookville) to take over Martins' NYS Senate nomination.

That created a vacancy for Blumencranz' nomination for NYS Assembly, and local home builder and former Legislature candidate Paolo Pironi was quickly nominated to run for that Assembly seat.

The candidacies of Blumencranz and Pironi represent a generational shift, as both are younger candidates.

Blumencranz, age 29, was elected to the NYS Assembly in 2022, and was re-elected in 2024.

Pironi age 38, ran for the Nassau County Legislature in 2021, losing very

narrowly to former County Legislator Joshua Lafazan. Two years later - after a series of scandals and controversies - Lafazan lost heavily - 42% to 58% - to current Legislator Samantha Goetz (R-Locust Valley).

"I built my career as a small business owner helping people achieve the American Dream of home ownership," stated Pironi. "Now I am prepared to bring that experience to Albany to bring real affordability to our state."

WHY DON'T THE DEMOCRATS EXPEL LUNATICS LIKE DELAURO, TLAIB AND OMAR

Following the 2022 elections, when it first became clear that newly-elected Congressman-elect George Santos was a fraud, pathological liar and a nut, Republican leaders moved fast to have him expelled. Op-Ed: Is Wokeness the New "White Man's Burden?"

In 1899, Rudyard Kipling published "The White Man's Burden," in which he urged American colonization of the Philippines and its people. Kipling argued that it was the moral imperative of white man to "civilize" the non-white Filipinos.

This exhortation by Kipling to "take up the white man's burden" elevates the white man to a place of moral superiority of a Biblical level, insofar as he evokes Moses leading the Israelites out of Egyptian slavery.

Kipling warns that opposition, in the form of the "blame of those ye better" and the "hate of those ye guard" are to be expected and endured.

The cognitive dissonance involved in the intellectual colonialism of the equity-obsessed liberal is quite astonishing.

Their self-aggrandizing goal is to virtue signal their moral superiority by improving society. But their view of how to improve society is by elevating "marginalized" voices. While that aim, in itself seems moral and honorable, it has two major flaws:

First, it makes its own (often arbitrary, and many times deeply flawed) determination of which voices are marginalized; and

Second, in order to amplify the voices of the marginalized it requires the non-marginalized to speak in their stead, which does indeed marginalize the voices it aims to amplify.

Participation by the marginalized is heavily supervised and scrutinized. Dissent by the marginalized is met with contempt, or else dismissed as "the hate of those ye guard." After all, it was the woke man who "brought ye us from bondage our loved Egyptian night."

Critical Race Theory (CRT) is an

academic and legal framework that holds that systemic racism is part of American society. CRT theorizes, and then concludes that racism is embedded in laws, policies and institutions that uphold and reproduce racial inequalities.

CRT offers the explanation that all manner of societal ills are a result of the

If systems and institutions are inherently racist and the purposeful elevation of minorities is required to right this wrong, then is it not incumbent upon whites to rectify these injustices? Does that not presume a dependence of non-whites upon whites for justice?

CRT is, then, the "woke man's burden" of "civilizing" our society by teaching children that the United States is a latticework of inherently racist systems in which non-whites are inferior to whites.

The critical theory of CRT simultaneously accepts, and teaches, as truth, that whites are born oppressors of non-whites and that non-whites are subordinate and inferior, and therefore doomed to be oppressed by whites.

Moreover, CRT reinforces these lies as truth, without acknowledging that the ideas that comprise CRT are merely perspectives that propel racism.

Ultimately, CRT does nothing to propose solutions to the very damaging ideas underlying the problems it creates.

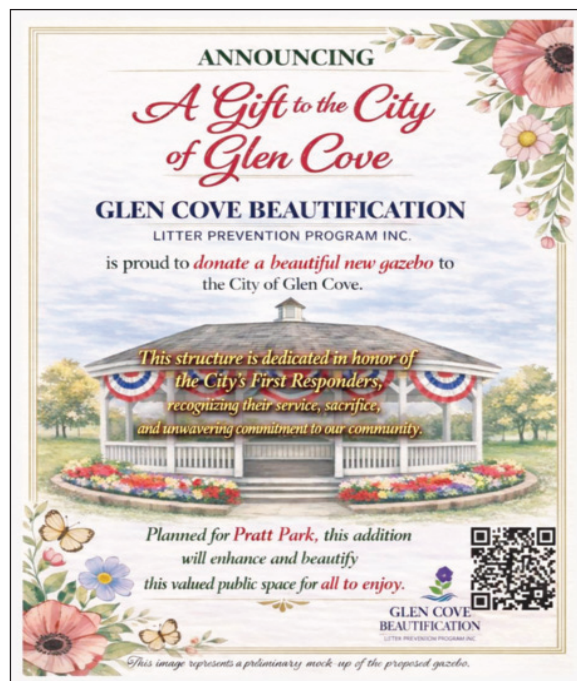

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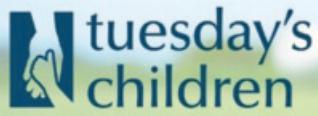

tions, including governance, financial health, land transactions and long-term stewardship. As part of this comprehensive review, the North Shore Land Alliance completed an extensive, months-long reaccreditation effort, dedicating more than 400 hours to a detailed application and documentation process.

This work included compiling records on conservation projects, financial practices and stewardship activities, as well as demonstrating the organization's adherence to national standards and best practices. 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It's a LiPetri vs Hach GOP Primary for NY3

The race for the north shore Third Congressional District (Huntington, Oyster Bay, North Hempstead and NE Queens) has just gotten a little more complicated as attorney Gregory Hach qualified to run a Republican primary against 2024 Nominee and current GOP designee, Michael LiPetri.

LiPetri, a former one-term NYS Assemblyman from Massapequa, is 35 years old, and ran as the Republican and Conservative parties nominee against incumbent Congressman, Democrat Thomas Suozzi (D-Glen Gove).

Hach, an attorney, is 55 years old, and was the founding partner of Hach & Rose a Manhattan-based personal injury law firm.

The Third congressional district is a classic "swing district" having voted for Joe Biden in 2020; but then voted for Donald Trump in 2024.

In the 2024 election, Suozzi narrowly defeated LiPetri for US Congress by only three points.

In 2022, the Third congressional district voted 58% for GOP nominee Lee Zeldin for Governor; giving

incumbent Democrat Governor Kathy Hochul only 42% of the vote.

In that election, disgraced fraudster George Santos won 54% against 46% for Democrat Robert Zimmerman, riding the "Zeldin wave" to an unexpected victory. Santos was removed from office only 11 months later and pled "Guilty" to multiple crimes before the federal court.

Both Hach and LiPetri are running as "MAGA" Republicans, and supporting the policies of President Donald Trump.

LiPetri has already received the Conservative Party line, having been endorsed by that party.

The Republican primary election will be held on Tuesday, June 23rd.

Nolan at the Movies: “Exit 8” an Indie Horror film with Existential Dread

It's been said by many that the horror movie genre has been on the up side lately.

This is captured in recent films, like the body horror of the Academy Award-nominated film “The Substance,” and the film “Weapons”, which earned an Oscar for Amy Madigan.

In some ways it could be argued that the new film “Exit 8” continues that trend.

Based upon the independent video game, “Exit 8” follows a man

stuck in a portion of a train station in a time loop. Along the way, he encounters a group of unsettling characters whom

he seeks to avoid.

The first thing worth noting about “Exit 8” is how intimate it feels. Director Genki Kawamura subtly masters a series

of disturbing imagery, and teases us with a deliberate slow pacing - to unnerving effect. He achieves this by focusing on small, yet off-putting shots.

Credit must also be given to the film's cinematography department, making “Exit 8” feel claustrophobic in its setting and surroundings.

“Exit 8” avoids the pitfalls of other indie horror movies, focusing less

on asceticism or gimmick and drawing attention rather to the existential anxiety of its protagonist, establishing personal



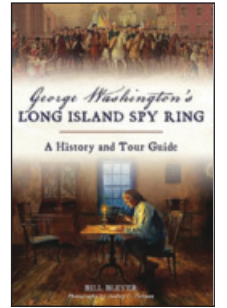
