George Santos Gets President Trump Commutation, Released from Jail

Fraudster ex-Congressman George Santos received a "Commutation" from President Donald Trump, and was released from federal prison on Friday, after serving only 87 days out of a seven year prison sentence. Trump also waived Santos' restitution to his crime victims.

Santos has been described as a "20year international crime wave," and has a criminal record in both Brazil and America.

This newspaper - The North Shore Leader - was the first newspaper to break the story and expose Santos' frauds - before the November 2022 elections - detailing Santos' lies, campaign frauds, and false financial filings, calling him a "fraud" and a "fabulist.'

After Santos was elected, the New York Times built upon The Leader's breaking stories, with a deep dive into Santos' frauds and crimes.

Santos served 11 months in Congress, before being expelled by a vote of 311 to 114 - more than the 2/3 vote required to expel a member of Congress - on December 1, 2023. He was only the seventh person expelled from US House Representatives.

Santos later pled "Guilty" to two counts of Identity Theft and federal Wire Fraud - and admitted to two dozen other crimes in a crying tearful plea before federal Judge Johanna Seybert.

Santos was admitted to prison in August 2025 but kept up a public relations campaign lobbying for a pardon from President Trump and crying about the "horrible conditions" in his minimum security federal prison.

According to Washington, DC sources, Trump was approached by Georgia Congresswoman Marjorie Taylor Greene, who pleaded Santos' case for a pardon.

Trump declined to issue a pardon, but commuted Santos seven-year sentence to "time-served" - 87 days - and waived Santos' mandatory restitution to the crime victims whom he had defraud-

In support of his commutation, Trump stated that Santos had been "treated horribly" by the federal prison

service, and that "At least Santos had the Courage, Conviction, and Intelligence to ALWAYS VOTE REPUBLICAN!"

"I disagree with the commutation" stated US Congressman Nick LaLota (R-NY1), who had voted for Santos' expulsion from Congress. "He should devote the rest of his life to demonstrating remorse and making restitution to those he wronged."

Santos reveled in the fact that Trump waived his obligation to make restitution and re-pay the people from whom he had stolen and defrauded.

"If [restitution] is required of me by the law, yes," stated Santos. "If it's not, then no.

Santos, who remains a convicted felon, was returned to his family Friday night, but one must wonder how his victims feel.

LV School Board Votes to Bar "Trans" Men from Girls' Bathrooms

The tide might be turning in America's schools as the more egregious aspects of the gender self-identification craze - that has been passing through America during the past number of years - are finally being rejected.

The Locust Valley School Board is being threatened by New York

Governor Kathy Hochul while complying with federal policy that bans transgender men using school showers and bathrooms designated for minor girls.

School boards in New York are increasingly caught in between federal law - and federal funding for schools - and state officials who want the schools to violate federal law, and have transgender men in girls' bathrooms and showers.

A "transgender" is a person who was born as a male - with a penis and testicles - but who now "identifies" as a woman. Identification does not require the man to have a penis amputation or castration - it just depends upon what the male person says that he identifies as - a man or a woman.

On Wednesday, October 15, the Donald Trump issued an executive Locust Valley School Board, under its order that "recognizes two sexes, male president, George Vasiliou, unanimously voted to establish a clear "transgender bathroom policy."

dents must use bathrooms and locker rooms that correspond to their 'biological sex' and not their 'gender identity'. The previous school policy stated that transgender men could use those spaces in keeping with their "expressed gender identity."

The present policy also, however, allows transgender students to use 'gen-

> der-neutral spaces' - such as private bathrooms and private showers - which the district has spent more than a year building.

> Locust Valley is the second Long Island school district to make such changes. Massapequa did so in September but on October 16 the New York State's education commissioner, Betty A. Rosa - a Hochul appointee - said that the Massapequa School District cannot enforce their policy until a lawsuit filed by the NYCLU on behalf of a transgender child is heard on appeal.

> Until then, young girls must parade naked at the school showers and use the toilet in front of "trans" men, according to Hochul's Education Commissioner.

In January, President

and female," which stated that "federal funds shall not be used to promote gender ideology."

Since then, the US Department of Education has enacted federal administrative law that mandates that local schools respect the privacy of young girls, and not require them to expose themselves in front of trans men.

New York State, however, which is run by Democrats, has called those executive order "legally ineffective."

Vasiliou said the board was put in an "impossible" position between conflicting federal and state mandates.

One Thousand attend Anti-**Trump Rally in Huntington**

Over 1,000 protestors thronged the intersection of Jericho Turnpike and Route 110 on Sunday as a local manifestation of the nationwide "No Kings" protest movement against President Donald Trump and his administration.

The protestors chanted "No Kings No Power" and "we the people will not be silenced," among other protests.

Much of the protest was because of President Trump's policies on immigration, with one woman shouting "Enough is enough of the Trump administration policy's from ICE raids to sending in National Guard troops to major cities.'

Trump increased immigration enforcement and border security, after his predecessor, Joe Biden, allowed over 13 million illegal migrants to come into the country during his four year administration. The migrants bankrupted cities and flooded neighborhoods with tent cities and a wave of violent crime. Biden admitted the migrants despite the Immigration laws of the United States that provide for enforcement and due process.

Biden is widely criticized for trying to "swamp" the United States with illegal and criminal gang migrants - from MS-13 to Tren de Aragua - in an effort to seize power and forever shift the demographics of America.

Other protestors opposed "cuts to Federal programs," according to one man at the protest.

According to Suffolk County police, the protests were peaceful, and there were no arrests.

President Trump achieved historic success this past week by bringing peace to the Israel Gaza conflict.

In addition to Huntington, there were "No Kings" rallies held in Port Jefferson Station, Patchogue, and Mineola.

GIVE CREDIT TO PRESIDENT TRUMP FOR GAZA-ISRAEL PEACE TREATY

After two years of awful, bloody war with 65,000 dead - the Israel-Gaza War has come to a negotiated end, thanks to the patient and persistent efforts of US Secretary of State Marco Rubio; US Special Envoy Steve Witkoff - and US President Donald Trump.

The war started with the October 7, 2023 military attack by the Islamist terror group Hamas - which controlled Gaza - into neighboring Israel. Hamas sent in over 5,000 armed troops, killing over 1,200 Israeli civilians - men, women, children, elderly - many of them Americans; and kidnapping 250 back to Gaza as hostages. It was bloody mass rape and mass murder.

The world condemned Hamas, and Israel struck back - promising to eradicate Hamas.

Two years later - with Gaza literally destroyed into rubble and over 65,000 Gaza Palestinians killed - half of them women and children - the world was turning against Israel.

The Trump administration intervened to stop the war - and secure the release of the last 20 hostages. Israel and Hamas signed a preliminary peace agreement. And President Trump was cheered in the streets of both Gaza and Israel as the peacemaker.

Many in America do not want to give Trump credit for anything. But on this front, even his bitterest critics should acknowledge that Trump and his team made the vital difference for peace.

A "THANK YOU" TO THE GOLDEN GLOBE DINER

When Hamas invaded Israel on October 7, 2023 - and took 250 innocent civilians hostage - many of them Americans - one local business took a public stand to demand that the hostages be released.

The Golden Globe Diner in downtown Huntington - under Greek-American owners Pete and Mike - posted 250 pictures of the hostages in their front windows and called for their release. A gesture of humanity and decency.

The negative consequences to the Diner were very real - and often ugly and criminal - as antisemitic groups targeted the Diner with death threats and a boycott. Vandals smashed the front windows and graffitied the building.

Last week - with the last hostages released - Mike and Pete took down the last hostage pictures.

SHELLFISH SANCTUARIES ARE NOW IN EFFECT IN OYSTER BAY

To the Editor;

Shellfish Sanctuaries Are Now in Effect in Oyster Bay

October 8 marked the beginning of a new era for Oyster Bay's marine habitat. That's when four new shellfish sanctuaries and three marine management areas went into effect. The shellfish sanctuaries will be used for planting clams and oysters and permanently closed to harvesting. The marine management areas will also be used for planting shellfish but may be conditionally opened for harvesting upon approval by the New York State Department of Conservation (DEC) and the Town of Oyster Bay.

For years Friends of the Bay has been advocating for the establishment of shellfish sanctuaries. These are areas of the bay where clams and oysters could grow and reproduce without being disturbed, to help restore the surrounding ecosystem.

During the past few decades, shell-fish populations have been in steady decline in Oyster Bay with the oyster population becoming almost nonexistent. The annual shellfish landing report from the New York DEC showed that only 12 bushels of oysters had been harvested from Oyster Bay harbor in 2024.

Until September 30, 2024, Frank M Flower and Sons shellfishing company had exclusive rights to 34 percent of the bay bottom through a 30-year lease with the Town of Oyster Bay. The company once operated a successful shell-fish hatchery that produced 50 million oyster seed and 50 million clam seed a year to restock the bay, but the company closed the hatchery in 2019. After that the company continued to harvest whatever shellfish remained until its lease finally ended.

At the expiration of the Flower lease, the Town of Oyster Bay established a six-month moratorium, which

was extended an additional six months, on any harvesting in the formerly leased lands. This gave the town time to conduct surveys to determine the condition of the bay bottom and the amount of shellfish left.

Under the new land use plan, none of the bay bottom is under lease and 6.2 percent is protected by shellfish sanctuaries and marine management areas. In addition, 93.8 percent of the bay bottom in certified waters is now open to independent baymen and the public.

The new plan is the product of a collaboration between various stakeholder groups including representatives from the Town of Oyster Bay, Friends of the Bay, the Oyster Bay-Cold Spring Harbor Protection Committee and the North Oyster Bay Baymen's Association as well as scientists from Adelphi and Stony Brook Universities.

Our shellfish populations will not rebound overnight. But establishing sanctuaries is an important step in the process of restoring the bay.

Raynham Hall was the home of Robert Townsend, a central member of George Washington's Culper Spy Ring. The home was occupied by British officer Col. John Graves Simcoe during the Revolutionary War. Transformed into a Victorian villa in the 1850s, the house offers two eras of interpretation, with the front of the house showcasing the period of the Revolution, and the back of the house preserving a late 19th century aesthetic.

Green Vale School Launches "Art on Loan" Program

The Green Vale School has introduced a new program, Art on Loan, thanks to the generosity and vision of parents Fred and Stephanie Clark. With distinguished backgrounds in the art world—including leadership roles at Findlay Galleries, one of the nation's oldest privately owned galleries—the Clarks are committed to making fine art an accessible, lived experience for students.

Through Art on Loan, the Clarks will periodically lend significant works of art to Green Vale, where they will be displayed on campus and integrated into classroom learning. The initiative encourages students to encounter art in their daily environment and to explore its connections to history, mathematics, language, and culture.

To inaugurate the program, The Clark's met with Upper School students for a conversation on art history and the power of visual expression. "The artist is

always in conversation with the viewer," she told students. "When you stand before a work, you must ask: What is the artist trying to convey?"

The first piece on loan, Peace (1965) by John Ferren, exemplifies the program's cross-disciplinary spirit. Ferren's mandorla series explores the intersection of geometry and emotion through bold color and precise form. Students will study the work not only in art classes—examining its

composition and technique—but also in history and math, connecting its abstract language to the cultural and intellectual landscape of the 1960s.

Building on this on-campus experience, the program will also include meaningful trips to museums, giving students firsthand exposure to diverse artistic voices and settings.

"Art on Loan brings students face-toface with original works and challenges them to think critically across disciplines," said Cathy Iannotta, Head of Upper School. "It shows them that art isn't confined to a museum—it's a way of questioning, connecting, and making meaning."

With each new installation, Art on Loan will expand Green Vale's campus into an evolving gallery, offering students a chance to experience art as a living dialogue—one that continues to inspire curiosity, creativity, and reflection

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


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
